THE object the Brothers have in view is to offer to the sons of gentlemen every facility for instruction in the principles and practices of their religion, and efficient preparation, by suitable courses of study, to occupy honourably and successfully whatever position in life they may be called upon to fill.

The most scrupulous attention is paid to the Morals, Health and Gentlemanly Deportment of the Pupils.

Great care is bestowed on the preparation for First Communion and Confirmation.

The College is situated in the healthiest part of London, and immediately faces the Common.

The building is constructed and arranged on the latest and most approved sanitary principles.

The assiduous care bestowed upon the health and comfort of the Pupils educated by the Xaverian Brothers has obtained the highest approbation of Parents.

COURSE OF STUDIES.

THE Curriculum embraces the usual Subjects of Study essential to a Liberal Education.

The Course for Students intended for mercantile careers comprises Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Typewriting, Shorthand, Commercial English, French, German and Spanish.

Laboratories, with all the latest appliances, have been constructed for those taking lessons in practical Chemistry and Physics.

A thorough grounding in Elementary Subjects is insisted on in the Lower Forms, whilst careful attention is paid to the initial stages of other subjects belonging to the general course.

Students are prepared for the Junior and Senior Branches of the Oxford Local Examinations.

Pupils who have passed the Oxford Senior Examination are prepared for the Higher Certificate awarded by the Oxford and Cambridge Examination Board, for the London University Matriculation Examination, and for various other Public and Professional Examinations.

There is a special Department for small boys, in which every attention is paid to the Elementary Subjects of Instruction.

Drill and Physical Training receive careful attention, and are under the supervision of a competent Military Instructor.

The Teaching is carried on by an efficient staff of Trained Masters and Lecturers, whose methods are such as to insure thorough and rapid progress.

A Report on the conduct of each Student, together with the results of the Terminal Examinations, is forwarded to Parents or Guardians at the end of each Term.

The Annual Exhibition of Studies and Distribution of Prizes take place before the Christmas Vacation.

TERMS FOR BOARDERS.

THE Scholastic Year is divided into Three Terms:—

First Term—From September 15th to Christmas.

Second Term—From Christmas to Easter.

Third Term—From Easter to the Midsummer Holidays (about the middle of July).

The Pension payable per term in advance, is:— £60 per annum.

Instrumental Music (Piano or Violin) £6 „

An account of the Personal Expenses of each Pupil for Class-books, Stationery, Postage, Pocket-money, Articles of Clothing, Mending, Washing and Medical Attendance, is sent to Parents or Guardians at the end of each term, along with the account for next term's Pension.

TERMS FOR DAY STUDENTS.

For the convenience of Pupils living at a distance, Luncheon and Tea may be had at the College.

OUTFIT.

BESIDES a supply of suitable outer and under-clothing for Sunday, as well as for daily wear, every Pupil must be provided with at least six towels, six table-napkins, napkin-ring, tooth, hair and clothes brushes, and all the articles requisite for the toilet of a young gentleman. Each article ought to be plainly marked with the Pupil's name or number.

VACATIONS.

THE Vacations are from six to seven weeks at Midsummer, three weeks at Christmas, and ten days at Easter. An extra charge of £1 5s. per week is made for Pupils who remain during the Easter and Christmas Vacations, and £2 per week during the Midsummer Vacation.

Classes are held from 9 a.m. to 12 noon daily, and from 1.30 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday; Wednesday and Saturday afternoons are half-holidays.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

PUPILS may enter at any time and are charged for proportionately to the beginning of the next term.

A Term's Notice or Pension for that period, is required previous to the withdrawal of a Pupil.

If a Pupil be withdrawn before the end of a term, no deduction is made except in case of illness.

Pupils coming from other Schools must be provided with satisfactory Testimonials.

No Pupil may leave the College under any consideration whatsoever, unless accompanied by a responsible person, and with the authorisation of a Parent or Guardian. Furthermore, the Pupil must be brought back to the College by a responsible person, and not later than 8 p.m.

The Visiting Days are Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays, from 2 p.m. till 6 p.m.

Pupils are expected to return to College on the appointed day at the end of the holidays, as laxity in this respect is highly detrimental to study.

The Principal reserves the right of instantly dismissing a Pupil, whenever he deems such a course advisable.

FURTHER DETAILS.

AT the beginning of the School Year, Pupils pay 2s. towards the support of the Library, and £1 for the use of the Table Service, Cleaning of Boots, etc.

There is a Committee of Games (Cricket, Football, etc.), the Subscription to which is £1 per annum.

The nearest Railway Stations are Clapham Junction and Clapham Road. Electric Cars run to and fro between London and Tooting, and stop at Nightingale Lane, within a few yards of the College.
